#### PROJECT PROPOSAL

Project Name: Language Monument (Bhasha Stombho)

<u>Location:</u> On the open space to the West of the parking lot on Riverside Drive at the foot of the Parent Ave, near Bert Weeks Memorial Gardens, Windsor, ON.

#### **Historical Significance of the Monument:**

The monument has a long chain of historical significance. It carries the concept of 19 years (1952 to 1971) of struggle with strong emotional power towards establishing a mother language and the emergence of an independent country, **BANGLADESH**. The concept design contains 19 solid concrete block representing strong struggle and 21 pasted glass blocks showing bonded emotions with hopes and prosperity germinated on February 21, 1952 which is the Bengali Language Movement, also known as "BHASHA ANDOLON". This is the first date of the revolutionary movement at Dhaka city where many of Medical and University students were killed with gun fire. Following that, after 19 years the country, Bangladesh, was born as an independent country in 1971.

Language is the most powerful tool to preserve and develop tangible and intangible heritage and to develop awareness of linguistic and cultural traditions throughout the world. As a recognition of lives-sacrifice of the brave Bengali students for preserving a mother tongue, UNESCO proclaimed 21 February (Ekushey February) as the International Mother Language Day (IMLD). The proposed monument is the greatest symbol of all these histories and incidents.

#### Project Significance to the City of Windsor:

Canada is the most liberal democratic country in the world where every people enjoys their freedom of language, culture, religion and heritage. Windsor is the city which is an example of a blended ethnicity and cultural diversity. The City administration and local Government always play important role in making the city colorful, decorative, a city full of beauty, a place full of historical monument, sculpture, plaques and so many. The proposed monument is the symbol of all international mother languages that can bring all nations' feelings to a focal point and make historic ties of saving mother tongue that emerged on February 21, 1952.

The Bangladeshi community in Windsor is one of the largest highly educated community who are also the part to make this city a beautiful historic place. The proposed project has a great significance towards these goals. Definitely this remarkable project can fulfill all the requirements as discussed in this section.

#### **Project Impact to the Community:**

By establishing such a historic monument, all communities in Windsor will easily swallow the history of International Mother Language Day (IMLD) recognized by UNESCO. All the diverse groups and their future generation will have good opportunities to learn the significance and respect to their own mother tongue. Students from all institutions can learn the history of international languages simply by visiting the monument without any text book. The monument will have structured platform for open space cultural program and accessibility for all diverse groups.

#### Significance to the Project Location:

The project location is significantly the best and appropriate location for such a historic monument. The skyline (backdrop) on the other side of the river, the beautiful US buildings & industries, and the suspension bridge show a physical neighborhood ties that will also enhance the beauty of the structure and draw the attention of the passers. It is on the bank of the Detroit River that symbolically carries the tiers of the crying mothers who lost their beloved sons in 1952. The location has parking lot, near Bert Weeks Memorial Garden, and exposed to the riverside drive, and easily accessible. In summer the location always has huge gathering of visitors who will enjoy the time and can easily learn the world language history without any extra efforts. From architectural view point the project in this location will significantly increase the beauty and decency of the landscape and will attract more visitors in day and night.

#### Project Importance/relevancy now and in future:

Because this is a historical structure, the monument has never ending importance. Once built, the monument will contribute significantly to cultural exchange, history, and heritage. The city of Windsor will be proud to be first city in Canada for such a historic monument with a symbol of International Mother Language Day and the struggling history of a nation to have mother language and freedom of a country, the **BANGLADESH**.

#### **Project Installation and Maintenance Cost:**

The project will cost approximately 80,000 CAD for complete structure with finishing having foundation, civil work, glass work, plaza, electrical work with lighting, metal lettering and the information board including maintenance costs.

The project funding for future maintenance:

The total estimated cost of the project is good enough for future maintenance after it has been built.

#### Accessible to Residences and Visitors:

It is located on the open space to the West side of the parking lot at the foot of the Parent Ave near Bert Weeks Memorial Gardens and exposed to the riverside drive. It is easily accessible to residents and visitors through road or river communication.

The project is acceptable to all residents and visitors regardless of race, religion, ethnicity, gender, age, or culture.

#### Project Material and Durability:

The details of the project is given below:


**Plaza:** The plaza will be a square space of  $50' \times 50'$  having a plinth of +2'-0" level for 1/3 portion. It will be made with RCC slab blocks laid in ground.

**Tower:** A 30' long tower having 40 blocks of glass and concrete among which 19 blocks will be made of RCC and 21 blocks made of pasted 12mm tempered glasses. Each block will have the dimension of 36"  $\times$  18"  $\times$  18" for both glass and solid. There will be RRC central core of a size 18"  $\times$  18" which will start from footing and will go up to end.

Letters: Different sizes of 'M' letters from different languages made of metal will be used on the solid surface for an icon of International Mother Language Day (IMLD).

**Information board:** The basic history of the IMLD and liberation of Bangladesh will be described with images on stone for the clear understanding of this conceptual design. Therefore, all materials used in this project are highly durable that will stand up over time.



TOD AINSLIE—Artist's Statement

My goal in documenting the sites associated with the Underground Railroad and the abolition of slavery, is to memorialize the heroic people who passed through them. All of these people have now gone, but the sites remain, and through them the important stories of these people and the events that happened can be told.

The pinhole camera is an excellent tool for bonding time and place. The necessary lengthy exposures enable changing light to infuse objects and places with the patina of time. Its tiny aperture, having unlimited depth of field, gives a wealth of information by focusing on everything in the scene at the same time. Combine this with black and white film plus the endless possibilities in camera design (involving focal length, aperture placement and the number of pinholes used) and verisimilitude follows. The viewer is then momentarily pulled into that time and place. I have used dodging and cropping for aesthetic purposes but not to depart from the image of what was originally captured by the pinhole.

As I worked with these primitive cameras and saw the images they produced, I felt a strong sense of the period's aura, a sense of the places themselves and an empathy for the people involved in that time and place.

#### Fakes and Forgeries: Yesterday to Today 4 February — 28 May


Can you tell the true object from the fake? This interactive exhibition presents 115 real and fake objects that run the gamut from historical specimens and cultural artifacts to household items and designer name brands. Visitors of all ages are invited to guess which objects are real and which are clever fakes. Learn how to tell authentic pieces from sly forgeries and discover the fascinating lengths forgers will take to hoodwink the unwary.

#### **ABOUT THE EXHIBITION**

The 1,500-square-foot exhibition features 11 cases, each devoted to a different category of artifacts and their corresponding forgeries. Every display provides hints on how to tell the real from the fraudulent and provides the visitor with a chance to guess an authentic artifact or specimen from an almost identical forgery. Seven cases feature items from the ROM's collection, spanning the Museum's dual mandate of Natural History and World Cultures. Two cases display modern knock-offs ranging from black market DVDs to designer brand clothing and accessories. Microsoft Canada contributes a case on counterfeit computer software and the Bank of Canada provides a display on the history of counterfeiting currency in Canada and an array of counterfeit bank notes.

Their work revolves generally around the kindness of Canadians, the safety of being in Canada and the warm welcome they have felt being in Windsor and at General Brock School.

























#### World War I Walking tour




Celebrations for Canada's 150<sup>th</sup> birthday have been dominating headlines nationwide, however, another important anniversary approaches: the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of Windsor Police.

Whether you are interested in the history of forensics before the use of DNA evidence, or fascinated by some of Windsor's most notorious criminals, the Windsor Police, has brought this history to life. Archival documents will explore and trace the progression of police force since its inception in 1867 when it replaced the Royal Canadian Rifle Regiment, while former crime fighting technology will reveal how police dealt with illicit breweries during prohibition. Highlights of the exhibit include a letter from the serial offender known as the Slasher who terrorized Windsorites in the mid 1940s, radar guns, mug shots from the 1950s through 1970s, hand cuffs, leg irons, protective bomb disposal suits, a breathalyzer machine, police call box and many other fascinating artifacts.






# Volunteer of the Year — David Hanna

The Dieppe Raid on 19th of August 1942 was the only large-scale assault on the coast of German occupied France prior to the allied landings in Normandy in June 1944. Entrusted largely to Canadian troops, it's objective, to be accomplished within one day was not to hold a bridgehead, but to test the feasibility of seizing a harbor intact, then considered a prerequisite to the landing of the vast allied force needed to liberate Europe. Of the 6,000 soldiers who embarked from the English South coast 5000 were Canadian and the remainder, British Commando troops with 50 American rangers and 20 free French. Eight destroyers (7 British, 1 Polish) escorted them.

Assault groups landed on the Western and Eastern flanks to disarm as many as possible of the German batteries and machine guns posted on the cliffs in advance of the main landing on the beaches. These landings were mostly unsuccessful.

At 0520 hours on the 19th August, 1942, the main Canadian assault began landing on Red and White Beaches supported by bombardment from both sea and air. The air battle was the largest single day battle of the war. The Essex Scottish Regiment was assigned Red Beach, which reaches from the harbour entrance on the east to approximately 500 meters west on the main sea front of Dieppe. Of the 553 members of the Essex Scottish Regiment assaulting this location, only 51 would be evacuated to England later that day, two of whom subsequently died of their wounds. Those who survived and were not evacuated spent the rest of the war as prisoners. The Essex Scottish sustained the highest level of losses

of any assault group engaged in the raid. The exhibit, the 75th Anniversary of the Dieppe Raid opens on the 19th of August.

The Métis are a distinct Aboriginal people with a unique history, culture, language and territory that includes the waterways of Ontario, surrounds the Great Lakes and spans what was known as the historic Northwest. In other regions of Canada people of French ancestry used the term "Métis" and those of Irish, Scottish, English and Welsh ancestry often used the term "Half-breed". There were many other terms used to describe Metis, such as Bois Brulé, Mixed-bloods, Bungii, Black Scots, Country Born, and Jackatars.

#### 9 May — 30June A Pussyhat Tale

The Pussyhat Project arose in support of the Women's March on Washington organized or the day after the Trump inauguration in protest of the sexist and racist rhetoric of the 2016 US election cycle. Pink Pussyhats served various functions: a very visible symbol of unity and protest, demonstrating the power of local and handmade work that is part of women's traditional labour, they also kept people warm at the January march.

In addition, they provided solidarity, in the making and the wearing, for people who could not attend the March. The concept of The Pussyhat Project and original – very simple – pattern for knitting was

the work of Krista Suh and Jayna Zweiman from Los Angeles, but many different patterns became available on-line, and the designers encouraged experimentation and variation.

#### **Sewing Straight Lines**

Sewing Straight Lines is a start-up cooperative put together by the Windsor Workers Education Centre in partnership with the Windsor Women Working with Immigrant Women. This cooperative gives immigrant and refugee women the opportunity to utilize their skills and knowledge in sewing to start a business under a cooperative model where the workers are the owners. This allows the women to take initiative and become further self-sustaining. Newcomers arrive in Canada with a cadre of experience,



education and creativity. Sewing is no exception and many of our clients have years of proficiency in textile work. The settlement process can often place demands that require newcomer women to place their focus elsewhere. This cooperative will allow women the opportunity to gain valuable skills of running a business such as managing finances and leadership skills. It will also empower these women who have faced multiple barrers with employment such as lack of Canadian experience and non-recognition of foreign education. Through empowerment immigrant and refugee women will feel a greater sense of integration in Canadian society while producing ethically made goods. Along with production of these goods, women will get the opportunity to socialize across cultures and communities, improving English and social skills.

#### The MayWorks Quilt Project



#### 4.1 Financial update on museum capital reserve fund (Museum Structural and Capital Improvements Fund 182)

M. Della Valle notes that she did not receive a recent update of this fund in time for the meeting; however this was received at the time of writing the minutes and the total is \$64,531.45.

#### 4.2 Continued leaking in fort

- M. Della Valle noted that there is still water leaking although much reduced following the work Oscar construction did sealing the steps (agreed to in January 2015). C. Middaugh explained the remedies applied thus far. Following a discussion of next steps it was agreed that M. Smithson will talk with Tom Graziano re asking Heritage Architect Chris Borgal from Toronto to come and view the site and provide his opinion and recommendations regarding next steps in dealing with this leak problem.
  - o Moved by D. Wilson, seconded by M. Smithson THAT the committee authorize the expenditure of up to \$3000 for the heritage architect to provide opinion and recommendations regarding next steps in leak problem at François Baby House.

#### 4.3 Museum Expansion project and François Baby House update

M. Della Valle and C. Middaugh reported:

- Closing of museum project meetings will be taking place soon. There may be some money left to be spent. Exact amount still being determined.
- Signage has finished being installed. Further lighting of signage is still being priced.
- Final exhibit The Vault Exposed installed at François Baby House in September
- Warrantee period for new exhibits ends in February 2017, and warrantee for construction ends in May 2017

#### 4.4 Fence taken down by St. Clair College

- M. Della Valle reported that Joe D'Angela, Director of Operations at St. Clair College (in response to a May 6, 2016 letter written by the committee requesting information on why a segment of the fence between the Francois Baby House and St. Clair College Centre for the Arts was removed) phoned and said:
  - o The section of fence was removed because trucks kept hitting it and that the situation was ever worse with the new parking allowed

across the street at the University of Windsor Social Work building.

- o He also said that he wasn't aware that the fence was WHSA's.
- Following a discussion, the Committee decided that Windsor Historic Sites Association would write a letter to St. Clair College asking them to replace the fence. They will cc the City's legal department

#### 5.1 Curb and grass in front of François Baby House

C. Middaugh will investigate to see if curb cut same as previous prior to new sidewalk construction (and also follow up on repair of grass by sidewalk – it was not replaced as part of sidewalk construction)

Discussion of possible fluctuating power supply to video unit. Electrician will be in to check outlet. If outlet is fine, and problem persists, M. Smithson proposed installation of a unit to supply uninterrupted power.
