It is my pleasure to share with you an enclosed copy of both *Pathway to Potential's (P2P's)* May and June 2013 newsletters. P2P AND VAP IN THE COMMUNITY

March 8: Voices Against Poverty (VAP) attended Poverty Free Ontario's Social Justice Day in Toronto. More than 20 other communities from across the province gathered to discussed and endorsed the Six Point Plan for a Social Justice Agenda.

2013 Ontario Budget Recap

Several sources, such as Poverty Free Ontario (PFO) and the Income Security Advocacy Centre (ISAC), believe that the proposed budget is progressive in that it has finally acknowledged the severe financial hardship that single adults on social assistance face. Indeed, OW and ODSP rates will increase by 1% as of September or October, and single adults without dependents on OW will receive an extra \$14 a month in addition to the rate increase. While the proposed budget changes may only increase the social



assistance for single adults by \$20 a month, a far cry from the \$100 that PFO proposed, it does suggest that PFO has finally been heard by the provincial government.

P2P hosts its Understanding Poverty Workshop for the third time on April 18

On Thursday, April 18, 2013, thirty-seven community members, educators, health professionals, and social service providers attended an Understanding Poverty workshop in Leamington at the Church of St. John the Evangelist.

The workshop consisted of discussions and group activities concerning: the definition, causes, types, and measures of poverty; lived experiences of people living in poverty relative to the experience of the middle class; and the intersecting barriers to escaping poverty. We also discussed what long-term social and political changes we could implement to reduce poverty within Windsor-Essex County.

Before starting the workshop, participants assessed their current understanding of poverty issues within our community. Of those who filled out the evaluation form, 50% stated that they had a moderate understanding of poverty issues in Windsor-Essex; while 58% had a high knowledge of challenges faced by people living in poverty in Windsor-Essex. Additionally, 58% rated themselves as having a moderate to high knowledge of community resources. Following the workshop, 77% felt they had a high to very high understanding of poverty issues in Windsor- Essex, 73% had a moderate to high knowledge of challenges faced by people living in poverty in Windsor-Essex, and 65% had a high to very high knowledge of community resources. Overall, many participants strongly agreed that the workshop's information was useful (69%), that the facilitator was knowledgeable (85%), and that they would recommend P2P's Understanding Poverty Workshop to a friend (88%).

P2P is pleased with the results of the workshop and looks forward to hosting more in the future.

Community Conversation with Pathways to Education took place on April 11

As a result of P2P's Literacy and Lifelong Learning Working Group, P2P and the local United Way hosted a community conversation with Pathways to Education to discuss how we can help youth in local neighbourhoods build their potential and graduate to post-secondary.

The United Way/Centraide Windsor-Essex County has agreed to take over the facilitation of the continued conversation and has set up a meeting for May 22 at 9 am to bring the interested partners together to discuss how to move forward.

Pathways to Education's innovative, community-based program has been helping youth in low-income communities stay in school and graduate to post-secondary for more than 10 years.



Transit Windsor's Affordable Pass Program

Many people take their access to a personal vehicle for granted, using it daily to get to work or to run errands. However, for some people on a low income owning a car is simply not feasible. Windsor is a vast community with limited cycling infrastructure, so most individuals without access to a vehicle use public

get where they need to go. The cost of a one-way bus ticket is \$2.50, so it is more cost-effective for frequent users to buy a monthly pass at \$79 - a rate that is far from affordable for most Windsorites living with low income.

To make transportation more accessible to individuals and families living with low income, Transit Windsor offers an Affordable Bus Pass Program (APP). Through this program individuals whose combined

household income falls below Statistics Canada's Low-Income Cut-Off are eligible to receive a bus pass for \$40 per month.

Windsor's APP assisted over 800 individuals in 2012, and seems to help with more than just transportation. "We don't always see the same people applying to the program. We actually see a growth where people apply to the

program, use it for their needs and then we don't see them coming back," said Rachaelle Pfaff, sales and marketing supervisor at Transit Windsor. "They have been able to enhance their life to the point where they maybe don't need the program, they have gotten over at hurdle in life."

Microloans available for Social Enterprise

The Ontario government recently announced a microloan fund for social enterprises. The province has partnered with the Centre for Social Innovation, TD Bank Group, Microsoft Canada, Alterna Savings, KPMG and Social Capital Partners to launch the Ontario Catapult Microloan Fund. The fund will be used to support social enterprises which create social, environmental, cultural or economic impacts within their communities that will generate revenue and create more jobs. The Ontario Catapult Microloan Fund is open to Ontario-based social enterprises and has begun accepting applications will be managed by the Centre for Social Innovation. The National Welfare Council is Back

According to Carol Goar of the Toronto Star, the president and vice-president of the Caledon Institute of Social Policy, Ken Battle and Sherri Toriman, took it upon themselves to revive a semblance of the National Welfare Council (NWC).

While their project will not have the federal advisory role once held by the NWC, Battle and Torjman will ensure that the Council's role in data collection and research continues. They intend to develop a "data hub," called the Canadian Social Report, which will provide an online resource of 72 social indicators for social policy researchers. Their first endeavour, which they hope to release next month, will provide an up-to-date version of the NWC's compendium of national welfare rates.

P2P's Adam Vasey on TV Cogeco's program: Let's Talk: Social Justice and Poverty


On April 24, 2013, Pathway to Potential's Adam Vasey, along with high school students from the Greater Essex County District School Board and the Windsor Essex Catholic District School



Board, participated in a one-day forum where they worked collaboratively to define poverty and identify initiatives that they are currently putting forth to prevent and reduce poverty within Windsor-Essex.

The students discussed important questions such as: What is social justice? Who is responsible for creating social justice? Where is social justice needed? How do we create social justice?

"Poverty is not just being materialistic and not having the items that others have. It's also about voicing yourself and not having the rights or freedoms or being socially accepted as you want to be," said Marissa Bumanlag, a student from Assumption College Catholic High School. "We forget to stand back and enjoy the richness in life and to just appreciate what we have. You don't realize that sometimes, we could be the next one that's one step away from experiencing what someone next to us in a room could be experiencing or maybe our classmate or co-worker."
