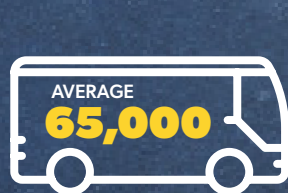

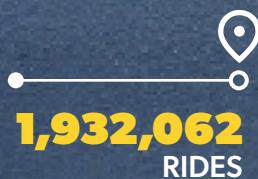

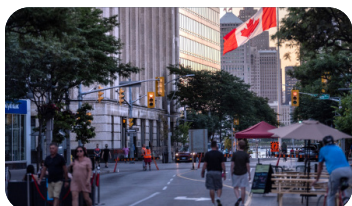
Strengthen the Core

Windsor's bold \$3.2 million downtown revitalization plan focused on safety, vibrancy, and attracting new investment through community-driven action.



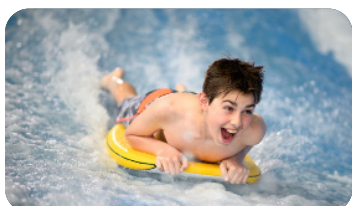
Civic esplanade revitalization

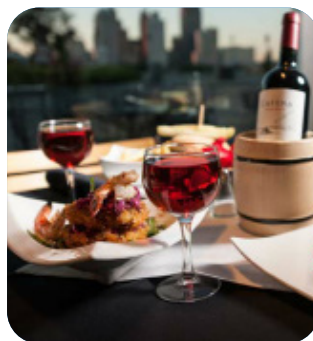

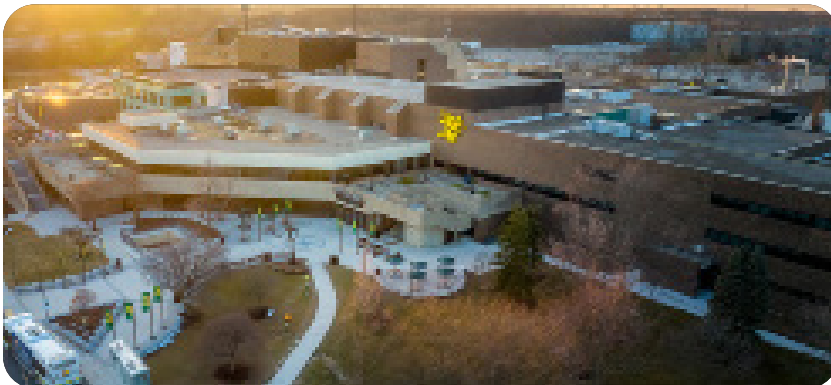
Education and key industries

Windsor-Essex is home to several major research facilities and institutes of higher education, as well as many facilities and programs that enable career-based training. With several strategic initiatives linking higher education and workforce development, it's no wonder our area's post-secondary programs are internationally recognized.



University of Windsor

Enrolls approximately 18,000 students and offers more than 190 undergraduate programs, over 65 graduate programs, and six professional programs. Approximately 30% of the student body are international students from nearly 100 countries.



St. Clair College

Provides higher education for 13,000 full-time students across the campuses in Windsor and Chatham. It offers more than 120 advanced diplomas, degrees, and graduate certificates focused on health, technology and trades, business and IT, media arts and social services.

2025 Tourism Economic Impact

Visitor volume in Windsor Essex hit 5.17 million visitors in 2025, which included 1.64 million persons staying overnight and 3.53 million day trippers.

Meanwhile, visitor spending hit \$816 million; with visitors spending \$2.2 million per day, on average.

Of our 5.17 million visitors, 1.7 million were international – the vast majority being from the U.S. The visitor economy supported \$1.2 billion in total business sales across numerous industries.
